MOANA: CELEBRATION OR APPROPRIATION?

May is celebrated as Asian American Pacific Islander Heritage Month. However, representatives of these groups argue that what is considered as celebration of their heritage is simply appropriation of their unique cultures. Pacific Islanders argue that they recieved some of the worst of it. When observing films from large companies such as Disney, some began to wonder about the true authenticity of the representation. Furthermore, some wonder if iconic films such as *Mulan* and *Lilo and Stitch* are simply empty ideological chasms that have nothing to do with said culture or have been misinterpreted all together. However, in recent years, the outcries have been heard and *Moana* is the result.

The film is set between 1100 and 800 BCE during the years of early voyaging and exploration of Pacific Islands such as Samoa, Tonga, and Tahiti. However, making sure that the island itself is fictional avoids the concern of appropriating specific island cultures. Not only does it avoid the appropriation in this way, but it also made history for the Disney films. For instance, in the musical number, "We Know the Way," the Samoan language is used in addition to English. Disney sadly boasts a rocky history of appropriating other languages that they do not fully understand. For example, in *Pocahontas*, the language in the opening number was only manufactured to sound like a Native language. Unfortunately, the native language of Pocahontas' people was similar to Throat Singing, an ancient Native tradition that is drastically different from the expectations of western music. By using the exact language of ancient Polynesia in *Moana*, Disney honors the history and people of the time in a way most have not seen before.

Pacific Islander culture faced many hardships, but many praise the film for its empathy toward the culture and toward the people. More films in the media should strive for the excellence and consideration of the *Moana* animators.

Colleen Hoover's Verity, a New York Times bestseller, is one of the many Colleen Hoover books I have ventured to read.
